## Mrs Joyce Stimpson

11 Nov 1922 - 17 Oct 2022 Joyce was well known to almost all the residents of Tur Langton where she was born and where she lived all her life until she passed away. She was born in Rose Cottage and moved to Jays Cottage in 1968, a house which she built together with her late husband, Jack. She was the fifth generation of her family to live in Tur Langton.She was always active in village life and was largely responsible with the Village Hall Committee for the building of the new village hall in 1974. She was a Parish Councillor for many years, a member of St Andrews PCC, the Mothers' Union, The WI and a Trustee of the Hanbury Institute

She was self-appointed custodian of the Churchyard and holds the map of where a lot of burials are situated including Harry Potter (!) her grandfather. She was the GO TO person for anyone who wanted to know about the village people and history. She was a loving family person through and through with a lively, bright nature, and a strong sense of fair play always prepared to stand up for her views and she will be sorely missed by all who knew her.

#### Highway Funding Mobile Speed Cameras

The parish council have been liaising with Leicestershire highways for locations where we can place the posts required for the mobile speed camera. The camera needs to be located in more than one location in the village, so as well as a position already identified on the B6047, Shangton Road, a further location is required on Main Street. We are therefore asking the residents of Main Street, if you would be happy for the camera to be located outside your property. It would be there for 3 to 6 weeks on rotation with the B6047 location. The map below shows the points between which it is allowed to be located, i.e. between Yew Tree Cottage and the boundary of Fargate Farm / Fargate House (90m from the junction). Ideally we would prefer a location on the

south side of the street as the mains water and gas run along the highway's land on the northside. We are researching different signs that are dimmer at night and with the possibility to turn off in the small hours.



Please contact the clerk or a member of the council or attend the next parish meeting for more information or to propose a location.

## Village Trees

So that we can try to keep the beautiful character of our village, the Parish Council is compiling a list of the most significant trees that we feel should have some form of protection, beyond planning the Conservation Area requirements. It is really quite surprising that there are no protected trees in the village at all at the moment. We would like to invite anyone in the village who has a tree or trees they would like to be considered to be put forward for a Tree Protection Order (TPO), to contact us. If we are considering a tree that is on your property, we will contact individuals so that you can have a say in the application of your tree. Please note that a TPO does not mean that a tree cannot maintenance have required or alterations carried out on it. We look forward to hearing from you.

#### Ash Dieback

There are no exact figures for the number of ash trees in Leicestershire, but it is estimated that there are more than half a million in the county, with around 120,000 of them at the side of roads. The highly destructive Ash Dieback disease is caused by a fungus and can lead to infected trees shedding branches or limbs, or potentially falling as the tree dies.

Many of the trees are on private land, and now Leicestershire County Council has launched a campaign to raise awareness of the issue among

residents, businesses and landowners to remind them of their responsibility to ensure their trees do not become a hazard.

As a landowner, you should try to:

- retain ash trees where possible, including existing (healthy) ash trees so that more tolerant individuals can be identified to provide stock for the future
- check for signs of ash dieback regularly
- have your trees regularly inspected by a professional
- minimise any pruning or tree surgery, as young regrowth is more susceptible to the disease
- keep an eye on the tree's safety as the disease progresses. If you are a landowner, you are responsible for managing the health and safety risks from dead and dying trees on your land
- pay particular attention to ash trees within areas where the failure of the whole tree or falling branches could place people or neighbouring property in danger
- monitor trees near highways and rights of way or areas with high levels of public access for signs of the disease, and if risk assessments show these as a hazard, plan careful pruning or felling
- consider planting other species appropriate to the location
- further information is available from the forestry Commission and the tree Council on the disease and what to look out for.

# County News Citizens Advice Trading Standards

Trading Standards are urging consumers who have bought goods from a business which has not been delivered in the agreed time frame to report this to Leicestershire Trading Standards. If it is claimed that a business is closing down or has closed down and the delivery or refund cannot be made please report your complaint.

It is the seller's responsibility to make sure the item is delivered to you. If your goods are yet to be delivered, under the Consumer Rights Act, you can ask the seller to deliver the item by an agreed date, a reasonable time is around 30 days. If you don't receive your goods, you can cancel and ask for a refund.
